A Message from our Team Rector, The Rev'd Roderick Withnell

In our digital world, how many of us remember typewriters? The transition from typewriters to computers occurred in most of our lifetimes. I started learning to type on a mechanical typewriter in my teens. Recently I've started using a tablet computer.

The Corona Typewriter Company began in the 19th century and produced excellent typewriters that many of us may have been using not so long ago. But the company did not make the transition from typewriters to computers, and so sometime in the 1980's it went out of business. According to a study, the company continued to make excellent typewriters right up to the end. In fact, it continued to perfect its product, making minor improvements until it finally went out of business. But why didn't it begin to make computers? The company believed that it was in the typewriter business. But this was not true. Actually it was in the communication business. People wanted its product as long as it was the best means of communication. When this was no longer the case, they switched to computers.

I think that there is a lesson here for churches. Sometimes we think that we are in the church business, so we make all sorts of improvements in the way that we do church — we tweak the tradition. But we are not really in the church business. Actually, we are in the 'Kingdom' business. The outward forms that this may take can change radically, but we are always in the 'Kingdom of God' business.

We can see this clearly if we look at the history of the church and the different types of worship and service that have gone before. We can see it today in the different types of worship and service that take place in Teignmouth, and across Devon.

We should not do as the church has done in many ages, insist that there is only one proper way to do things. After all, we are the inheritors of a reformed tradition that is itself anti-traditionalist. Wouldn't it be ironic then, if we, of all people, insisted on maintaining traditions that had outworn their usefulness? We should be wary of producing better and better typewriters in an age of computers. That's to say, we shouldn't keep trying to perfect something if it has been superseded. And, of course, we should be careful not to allow a large rift between our church culture and the general culture

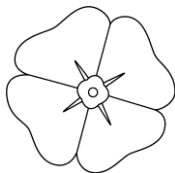
To put it positively, we should remember that though Christianity has been around for nearly two thousand years, it is still something relatively new in the world; it is something that will never lose its ability to appeal to new generations. Looking through the New Testament, it's wonderful to see how many times the word 'new' appears.

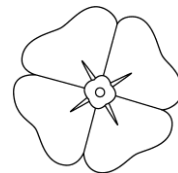
"We are a new people. We have been given a new covenant. We are new creations and will see a new heaven and a new earth."

If you have thought about attending a Village Worship service in Ideford on the 2nd Sunday of the month, but haven't got there yet - there is now an added incentive!! Coffee is always served after the service - and Alan, our Churchwarden, has started to bring home made cookies for us all to enjoy. They're so delicious, we have persuaded Alan to share his recipe each month - here is the first. However, if, like me, you think food always tastes better when someone else cooks it for you - we look forward to seeing you at Village Worship very soon!

QUICK CHUNKY CHOCOLATE COOKIES

Ingredients to make 30 cookies:-

- 250gms caster sugar
- 225gms self raising flour
- 75gms plain flour
- 150gms either milk or dark choc buttons or chocolate chopped from a cooking chocolate bar
- 175gms butter
- 2tsp vanilla extract
- 2 eggs beaten



Method:-

1. Preheat oven to 180C .
2. Put sugar flours and chocolate chips in a large bowl.
3. Dice the butter and then melt it in a saucepan or microwave.
4. Allow to cool slightly and then add vanilla extract and eggs .
5. Tip this mixture into the dry ingredients and then using a round bladed knife mix until the ingredients begin to bind together.
6. Then using your hands form the mixture into a dough and turn out onto a well floured working surface.
7. Shape the dough into a sausage shape approx. 4cms thick. Then using a sharp knife cut 1cms wide slices.
8. Place the slices onto well greased baking sheets and bake for 15-20 minutes until a pale golden colour.
9. Put onto a wire rack to cool and then transfer to an airtight container when fully cold .

AN AUTUMN MESSAGE

As we head towards the autumn & winter months, apart from protecting your property from the elements, you also need to protect it from the opportunist burglar. Fitting timer switches to standard or table lamps can give the impression of an occupied house, useful when it's dark at 4pm and you are still at work. The switches can also be used to turn on a radio to give anyone close to the house a further sign of occupancy. They are also great for when you are away on holiday. Remember to use a door chain for unexpected callers until you know who they are, particularly in the dark winter months.

When boats are craned out at Polly Steps the boating season ends. The mooring and storage of the boats can attract the criminal element in our society who will endeavour to steal anything easily removable including outboard engines, fuel, electronic aids, fishing tackle and anything of value. Boat tenders are easily moved and are a popular item for re-sale; secure them to a fixed point using a quality chain or lock. Chain up any access ladders to prevent thieves easily getting on board. Remove oars. If your outboard engine is left on the craft, the engine cover can be removed and use a Devon & Cornwall police marked temporary engine cover, which is wind and weatherproof. The thinking is that an outboard engine cannot be sold without its original hard cover. There is a cost for these items, but it's a lot less than an engine. Contact me for more information.

Is your car ready for autumn and winter? Cold weather puts a high demand on the car battery. If in doubt get it checked at your local garage and ask them to check the engine antifreeze strength when you're there. Are your car's wipers & washers effective? Do all the lights work? Are your tyres correctly inflated and with plenty of remaining tread? Is the car heater effective? Does the heated rear window work? Keep your windows clean, a low winter sun can be blinding. Ice and snow should be removed from all windows before driving. Are your brakes effective? Remember braking distances will multiply in wet/icy conditions, particularly if you are going downhill. Don't get caught out, keep your distance from the vehicle in front. Drive according to the road conditions. Speed limits are the maximum for a given stretch of road, not a target. If it's unsafe to reach the limit then drive slower. Always use your seatbelt, do not use a mobile without a hands-free kit and if daylight is poor, use your headlights.

Once again I have to report that drivers are selfishly parking, causing inconvenience to other motorists and pedestrians. Church Road in Ideford is one example, but all the villages suffer. Think before you park your car and if there is any doubt, park it elsewhere.
